NOTE

- The above business counts from Queensland Treasury include rounding of data by the ABS. The data presented at these detailed levels will not always be additive as each of the components are individually rounded.

Sole Trader Definition:

- The definition of a Sole Trader differs from that of a non-employing small business.
- The term Sole Trader is a type of legal organisation of a business. The ATO provides the following definition of a sole trader: 'A Sole Trader is an individual running a business. It is the simplest and cheapest business structure. If you operate your business as a sole trader, you are the only owner and you control and manage the business. You are legally responsible for all aspects of the business.'
- Sole traders can and do employ people.
- The major feature of being a sole trader is that the business owner is fully liable for all aspects of the business and any losses the business may incur. As a result, it is common, as a business grows, for it to move to a business structure where liability is limited (such as in a Pty Ltd company) or shared (as in a partnership).
- Non-employing small businesses do not employ any staff.

Unemployment Data Disclaimer:

The Queensland Government Statisticians Office notes: Due to the high standard errors associated with regional labour force survey data, the ABS and QGSO recommend using 12-month averages to reduce the volatility of the underlying original data. This volatility means it can be difficult to detect real world phenomena, such as those caused by the social distancing measures introduced to combat COVID-19, in the data. As a result, it is not recommended regional labour force data be used to assess the impact of COVID19.

It should be noted that the ABS Labour Force Survey for April 2020 currently does not report trend data due to a structural break in the series caused by the impact of substantial social distancing and other policies designed to contain the spread of the COVID-19 outbreak. The state unemployment rate presented here is in seasonally adjusted.

The Business Support Grant was administered by Queensland Rural and Industry Development Agency (QRIDA) and Queensland Revenue Office (QRO). Business size for the Business Support grant is determined by payroll and not the employee headcount which is normally used to define small businesses. The approved and paid amount reported is the full amount granted and has not been separated into the State and Federal contributions. Sole Traders (non-employing) data (QRO) includes partnerships and companies where there are no employees working for the business and will be reported under this category regardless of business size. Any sole trader that applied with employees (not including owner/s) will be counted in the data (QRIDA) under the small, medium, or large business categories based on payroll amounts. Data reported has been geocoded based on the applicant's longitude and latitude.

Border Zone Hardship Zone Grants was administered by Queensland Rural and Industry Development Agency (QRIDA) and Queensland Revenue Office (QRO). Applicants of QLD border locations who have already applied and been approved for a Business Support Grant are eligible to apply for this grant. The funding for this grant forms part of the Business Support Grant Funding. QRO approves the Sole trader (non-employing) businesses.

• The total number of people under free training arrangements is 558

This figure is drawn from the TPAY system and counts the number of people who have commenced a new course, module or competency since 31 August 2018 and who are eligible to access support under free tafe (User Choice), Free Apprenticeships for Under 21s and free tafe (C3G). It also includes the additional Under 25s that commenced from 1 January 2021 in the eligible qualifications for Free apprenticeships for Under 25s.

• The total free apprenticeships supported as at 24 June 2022 is 546 which comprises of 455 Under 21 and 91 Under 25.

The number of free apprenticeships for Under 21s is drawn from the TPAY system and counts all people who have a training contract for an apprenticeship or traineeship under User Choice; and meet one of the following:

- a. commenced their contract under free tafe anytime from 31 August 2018 (within 12 months of completing year 12); or
- b. commenced their contract prior to 1 July 2019, and were under 21 at 1 July 2019, and had a training component left to commence at 1 July 2019, and were not previously counted under free tafe; or
- c. commenced their contract aged under 21 after the free apprenticeship implementation on 1 July 2019, and have commenced a new course, module or competency

The number of free apprenticeships for Under 25s is drawn from the TPAY system and includes apprentices and trainees aged between 21 years and 25 years that commenced from 1 Jan 2021 in the eligible qualifications for Free apprenticeships for under 25s.

• As at 24 June 2022, the number of free tafe Certificate III Guarantee (C3G) participants Under 21 is 12 and the number Under 25 is 0.

The Under 21 cohort is drawn from the TPAY system and counts all people who started a new course, module or competency towards a C3G course within 12 months of completing year 12 and were under 21 at commencement.

The Under 25 cohort is drawn from the TPAY system and counts all people who started a new course, module or competency towards a C3G course that were under 25 at commencement from 1 January 2021.

Free Apprenticeships New Contracts since 1 July 2019 (U21) & 1 January 2021 (U25)

• The number eligible to take up Free Apprenticeships for Under 21s in Noosa since 1 July 2019 is 412

This number consists of 46 school leavers who are eligible under the free tafe for school leavers initiative and 366 additional apprentices and trainees who have since become eligible under the expanded free apprenticeships for Under 21's initiative.

- The number eligible to take up Free Apprenticeships for Under 25s in Noosa since 1 January 2021 is 80
- The number of Free Apprentices currently in training in the Noosa Local Government Area is 425. This is comprised of 334 Under 21 and 91 Under 25 eligible participants.

New contracts for Under 21s are the number of apprentices and/or trainees that commenced their training contract since 1 July 2010 and Under 25s commencing from 1 January 2021. These numbers are sourced from the DELTA database and count all people where their training contracts have been registered, irrespective of whether they have accessed subsidised training. It does not include those that have commenced employment but have not yet lodged their training contract. In addition, it includes students currently not active as a result of completing or cancelling their training contracts.

In training figures reflect the number of active training contracts on the specified date, regardless of their commencement date, where no advice has been received by the department to indicate otherwise. The numbers shown will change over time as the parties to training contracts report further commencements, completions, or cancellations to the department. This figure is sourced from the DELTA database and counts participants irrespective of whether they have accessed subsidised training.

It should be noted that there is often a long lag time between signing a training contract and accessing training, particularly for first year apprentices.

The number of New Contracts Since 1 July 2019 (U21s eligible) and 1 January 2021 (U25s eligible) should not be added to:

- The number of people under Free Training Arrangements; or
- The number of people under Free Apprenticeships; or
- The number of people under Free tafe Certificate III Guarantee, as the categories are not mutually exclusive and adding them together will result in over-counting.
