

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KEY LEARNINGS Case study typologies

- Building design and location impacts access – proximity is key
- Public perception of space influences engagement
- Adequate program resourcing needed for sustainability
- Partnerships essential
- Catalyst activities required to engage community


| EDUCATION | Alternative learning (e.g., Special Assistance Schools) | For 80-120 students, aged 8 to 18 years Operated by secular non-government school entity |

| HOUSING | Affordable community housing | Near the education precinct 50 residents aged 45 years and above Managed by not-for-profit provider or government |
| COMMUNITY CONNECTION | Intergenerational relationship structure | Community-led organisation to create shared meaning and purpose to strengthen relationships and learning between students, seniors, and the broader community. |
| COMMUNITY INCLUSION | Wider pomona involvement | Structure to encourage Pomona residents not living in affordable housing to participate in intergenerational activities. |
| 00/50/44/05 | Ownership and agreements | Separate ownership of each entity, with an Memorandum of Understanding binding the school and seniors for operational purposes. |
| GOVERNANCE | Management entity | Dedicated management structure and entity to coordinate detailed cooperation of all parties. |
